HOUSE SYSTEM

We reviewed our pastoral system and wanted to look at how we celebrate and reward the excellent behaviour, work and attendance of the vast majority of our students. One way we decided would allow us to do this and introduce healthy competition was through a house system. We asked students and staff for suggestions and, alongside Harry Potter ideas, we decided to name our 5 houses after people who had shaped Liverpool. 11 people were shortlisted and 11 members of staff championed a certain person in a whole-school assembly. All staff and students with the exception of me, had a vote. There were 5 clear winners:

ASPINALL HOUSE MR CUMMINGS GREEN	The chairwoman of the Hillsborough Family Support Group, whose son James died in 1989. Margaret is an inspiration to us all. Even when it seemed like the whole of the establishment was against her and the families, they fought and they fought until they achieved justice. To suffer the loss that Margaret and the dozens of families did is the worst nightmare for any family but to then have to wait more than 20 years to clear the names of their loved ones who died is unimaginable. The whole country has seen how they have carried the fight with dignity, with a refusal to give up on the truth. She truly is a woman of achievement.	
MS FLAVIN BLUE	John Alexander Brodie was a Liverpool-based civil engineer who can lay claim to a number of crowning achievements. Credited for introducing Britain's first ring road, electric tram system and intercity highway, his finest achievement is arguably The Mersey Tunnel. He's also credited as introducing the first football net in 1889 - all of this from a man from Ullet Road – right on our doorstep!	
MS MCGHEE YELLOW	William Roscoe was a Liverpool politician and a self-taught polymath! A historian, leading abolitionist, art collector, M.P., lawyer, banker, botanist and writer. He played a key role in the abolition of the Slave Trade. He is described as an inspiration that believed in equality for all, a voice for the voiceless. He also founded what is now Liverpool John Moore's University. And 2 of his descendants at St Hilda's are in his House!	
WALKER HOUSE MR MARTIN ORANGE	Gee Walker - When her son Anthony was brutally murdered in a vicious attack, the local community in Liverpool was united in anger. Gee found the courage to forgive his killers. She has since established a foundation to promote racial harmony and assist efforts to turn lives around in the community. At a time of tension in pockets of society, Gee offers her heartfelt and life-affirming message about forgiveness, recovery and above all, hope. Gee talks about the power of forgiveness, learning to cope with loss, and using the tragedy to make a positive difference. Gee's granddaughter is in Walker House!	
MR WASHINGTON RED	Kitty Wilkinson spent much of her life in abject poverty, but that didn't stop her from devoting herself to improving the lives of those around her. When the cholera epidemic broke out in Liverpool in 1832, Kitty was convinced that cleanliness was the key to combating the outbreak. Kitty turned her small home into a wash-house. She allowed the people of Liverpool to come and clean their sheets and she taught them about the importance of cleanliness when fighting cholera. Kitty pushed for the development of a public bath where the poor could wash themselves and clean their clothes. In 2012, a marble statue of Kitty was unveiled in St. George's Hall and of the 12 statues honouring famous figures, Kitty is the only woman represented.	

Students have already applied to be House Captains and interviews will take place on Monday. Our launch assemblies last week were really exciting. All students found out which house they are in. All members of staff are attached to a house apart from me. I need to remain impartial! St Hilda's College students are all affiliated to a house and will help to support and drive the house system forward. The friendly rivalry has already begun with points for houses being awarded to our Sports Day competitors!

We are issuing all of our students in current Years 7 - 10 with a new tie in house colours free of charge. These will be available towards the end of summer. Staff will have lanyards in their house colours so that all are easily identifiable as members of that particular house.

A separate letter has been sent explaining uniform and PE kit changes.

BEHAVIOUR FOR LEARNING – REWARDS AND CELEBRATIONS

We have worked very hard with students and staff on reviewing our house point system and rewarding our students. Mrs O'Neill and Mr Martin are finalising a system of rewards and consequences and we will share this with you in September. Students and staff have been consulted and have come up with some great ideas! We believe that creating a culture of celebration and reward will enable us to really promote our new values and the achievements of our wonderful students.

SIAMS AND OUR VALUES

We are very proud that the work we do in school and in liaison with you as parents/carers to develop our Christian ethos and we were delighted to be awarded OUTSTANDING across all 4 areas in our recent SIAMS inspection. The inspector commented on our decision to change our values in a SIAMS year and was very impressed that we took that bold decision and agreed fully with the changes. Our values shouldn't just be words we use in letters home or inspections, but how we live every day. We decided to use the Church of England values as they reflected who we want to be as a school. However, one of my proudest moments this year was when the students decided on our 5th value of equality. Having young people here who value equality and appreciate diversity is extremely heart-warming.

CATERING UPDATE

We have reviewed the food that we are serving and the logistics of how we cater for our students. Queues were long and some students waited a long time to be served. We have changed the layout of the kitchen to ensure that food service is faster than it was. We have also added a satellite food servery which sells sandwiches, drinks, fruit etc. The students' feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. There is significantly less queuing and students are able to spend more time relaxing in between lessons. This is also the case at break times. We have also extended the indoor seating areas for students, which has also been very well received. Our plan is to extend the satellite food servery and serve hot food to students too.
