Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you for all of your very positive feedback after the last 'different look' newsletter. We are blessed with staff who really want to make sure that your sons' and daughters' experience of school is a really positive one. I wanted to make sure that you all knew about things that are happening at St Hilda's organised by our very hardworking staff, both teaching and support staff alike! It has been a very busy term, as you will realise as you read further!

Thank you for your support and messages after having to close the school during the unexpected snow. It is not a decision I take lightly and I also understand the impact this has on your busy lives too. I am afraid that our site was not safe for students, and having witnessed crashes outside the school and a fall, my decision was the right one.

Our busy term since January has included so many opportunities for students; Year 10 Geographers went to Colomendy to complete their coursework. They missed our school 'snow day' and Mr Norton had to rearrange their activities on the Thursday due to the 'Beast from the East' disrupting their plans too! Year 13 Geographers had a very early start at Liverpool Airport to fly to Belfast to visit places of interest. Thanks to Mrs Murray and the maths department, we secured a very strong silver award in the Liverpool Counts Quality Mark assessment! Our assessor was really impressed by how we all use maths in the school, outside of maths lessons.

Year 8 and 9 parents and carers joined us for our one-to-one interviews regarding option choices. Both year groups had lots of information to help make the right choices; Guided Options Open Evening, assemblies, UCAS and applying to university sessions, taster days and a meeting with pastoral and senior leadership teams. It was a pleasure to have the time to sit down and speak to so many students, parents and carers.

We hosted a very special visitor too, Tomi Komoly, a Holocaust survivor, came into school to share his experiences with our students. He was born in Budapest in 1936 and experienced the anti- Jewish laws introduced during the 1940s by the Hungarian government. Tomi's story is a stark reminder of what did happen and lessons we need to learn.

We had fundraising and even a rap battle, organised by our students who will be attending the HOBY Leadership conference residential during the Easter holidays. Mrs McCann and Mr Martin deserve a special mention for their raps.

I had the privilege of attending Birkenhead High School to watch our choirs in a competition. This was a weekend of performance and the quality of choirs, musicians and dance was very high. I am so proud to say that both of our choirs won their categories and the Chamber choir received the highest score of any choir we have entered into such competitions. The Tone Roses, our staff, parents, college student band, also won in their category. A special mention to Ms Tamo for her very passionate solo at the start of 'I will survive'. Seeing so many staff and students giving up their weekend to compete, not to mention the hours of practice, was so heart-warming.

It was our Easter Eucharist today. It was a very special one as I was able to welcome back Mrs Benson, former headteacher, to say goodbye to our Chaplain, Gill Pinnington, who is leaving us after over 11 years here. Article to follow later in this newsletter.

We are so sorry to lose her, but know that her new parish needs her and will benefit from her down-to-earth approach and great sense of humour!


Good luck, Gill. Thank you for all that you have done and keep in touch!

Holocaust Survivor Visit



On Monday 19th March all of Year 8 and 9 participated in a visit organised by the History department. Tomi Komoly, a Holocaust survivor, came into school to share his experiences with our students.

Tomi was born in Budapest in 1936 and experienced the anti- Jewish laws introduced during the 1940s by the Hungarian government.

Our students have been studying Nazi Germany and the Holocaust in History. Students and staff were profoundly moved by his remarkable story.

Belfast 2018

Twelve bleary eyed students met at John Lennon Airport at 4.50am. Students expressed their delight at this early start!

A short flight to Belfast followed.

Once in Belfast our day of discovery began. A visit to South Belfast and the University Quarter led to the consumption of an Ulster Fry (Mr Martin insisted all students try the soda bread). Students now fed and watered were ready for the day ahead.

A journey east to Parliament Buildings (Stormont) was one of the high points of our day. Students were treated to an excellent tour by our guide Micky. Micky was equally as delighted to stumble across a group of Liverpudlians on tour. Students had a tour of the NI Parliament Buildings and gained some valuable insights into the peace process in Northern

Ireland.



After our tour the trip moved on to the city centre. Students enjoyed time to have lunch, visit the tourist hotspots (Belfast city hall, Victoria Square shopping centre to name but a few). With leprechaun pencils purchased and local cuisine sampled (Nando's and Mc Donald's for most) it was off to the Crumlin Road Gaol (jail).

Belfast's oldest remaining jail was an intimidating place. Students commented on the fact it was ice cold on each wing. Some fabulous information from our guide followed and students got a real idea of the issues faced by prisoners and staff alike.

At the end of the tour we had the opportunity to visit the room that contained the hangman's noose. Students were glad to leave this eerie room behind.

It was then time to leave the Crumlin Road. The Peace Wall beckoned. Students were amazed by the fact in 2018 a 30ft wall divided people by religion.













Loggerheads Colomendy Trip

As part of the GCSE we have to experience at least 2 days of fieldwork, we spent 3 days at loggerheads studying the river. We went from Wednesday 7th March- Friday 9th March.

We went to loggerheads as it offers an excellent site for a river investigation. On the Wednesday we investigated:

The velocity of the river

The depth of the river

The flow of the river

The size of rocks at different points of the river

We used a range of tools to do this such as:

Ranging poles, measuring tape, metre ruler and something that floats (stick or tennis ball) by doing these tests we were able to notice small changes that happen as you move further down the river.

First of all, we needed to investigate the velocity of the river. To do this, we used our ranging poles to mark each side of the bank of the river, then we used a measuring tape to measure the width in meters, then we went across the river measuring its depth every 50cm with a meter ruler measuring the height of the water. We worked in a group of around 7 to carry out each test on each site at the river.

As we moved further downstream the height of the water got lower because the river contained limestone which is permeable so water can go underground or get caught in a swallow hole.

The rocks got smaller as we went downstream because the speed of the river got slower so it couldn't carry larger rocks down the river.

The recent snow from 'The Best from the East' meant a lot of snow melt was added to the river, this meant that the river had a lot more water than usual and it was very deep and fast flowing in parts, but eventually we found a safe spot further downstream.



World Book Day

Pupils and staff came dressed as their favourite book characters, we shared a whole school read, wrote diary extracts as our favourite story characters and tried to match famous quotes with the people who said them.
