A message from Mrs Code

Dear parent/carer

With all of the communications regarding the pandemic, I thought it was a good time to share what we have been doing in school over the past few months. Despite periods of self-isolation for some students, our St Hilda's family has continued to look after each other and learn together. Yes, things are more difficult as we live in year group 'bubbles' and our students do not mix with other year groups in school, but we are using technology to allow us to make sure that our Houses still feel like Houses, so that we are able to gather together, albeit virtually.

We have welcomed the Army into the school to test those who had consent. This week they were in on Monday and Tuesday and we tested over 800 students. No tests came back positive, which is really reassuring. This ties in with the fall in positive cases across Liverpool since mass testing began and is testimony to how we as a city are working hard to stay safe. Thank you for all of your support!

We start our first digital parents' evening on Thursday and we have made some slight changes to other parents' evenings in line with our recovery curriculum and assessment times. A letter inviting you to these will be sent in advance and you are able to book your time slots. It really is not the same as welcoming you in our school, but the feedback is really good. Parents have felt less rushed as they can attend wherever they are.

Festival – Happy Diwali

This year the RE department have introduced our students to the festival Diwali through their PD sessions, RE lessons and a celebratory lunch of traditional Indian cuisine. Often known as the festival of light. It is a 5 day festival that starts on 12th November and will be celebrated worldwide by Hindus and Sikhs.


World Philosophy Day

This week staff and pupils have enjoyed flexing their brain and considering philosophical questions as part of St Hilda's celebration of 'World Philosophy Day'. Lower school have considered questions such as 'what will make us happy?' and considered the ideas of a famous thinker called Aristotle who said that being a good person, rather than seeking fleeting moments of pleasure, can make us truly happy. In form period, all year groups tackled a number of 'though experiments' from famous philosophers. For example, 'Shoemaker's brain experiment'. Two people, Jack and Tom, have brain surgery. 
As part of this government funded programme, schools can choose to offer children a healthy breakfast at school or at home.

Unifrog

In keeping with our commitment to provide students with outstanding careers guidance and tailored support when choosing their next step after school, we will now be using Unifrog; an award-winning, online careers platform. All students in Years 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 will have access to this excellent website.

Unifrog brings into one place every undergraduate university course, apprenticeship, and college course in the UK, as well as other opportunities, such as School Leaver Programmes, MOOCs and every college at Oxford and Cambridge. This make it easy for students to compare and choose the best university courses, apprenticeships or further education courses for them. They can also explore exciting opportunities further afield by looking at English taught undergraduate programmes available in Europe and the USA.

Additionally, the platform helps students successfully apply for these opportunities by writing their personal statement, applications and CVs and guiding them through the process, allowing teachers to give live feedback.

Students access the tool for the first time using a sign-up code which is unique to their form group. They then login using their email address and password and they can do so from any computer, tablet or smartphone. We would encourage you to use the platform with your child so you can support them through the process of deciding their next step. A parental log in is on its way.

Christmas Scholastic Book Fair

Our annual Christmas Scholastic Book fair will still take place this year. The fair will arrive in school on 2nd December and will be collected on 16th. Obviously things will have to work slightly differently this year so pupils, parents and staff will receive an online booking form a couple of weeks before the fair arrives, this will contain images of the cover of every book being sold, along with a description and price. Books can be selected using this form and paid for in advance, by phone, directly with Scholastic.

This year has been really difficult for the library; not just because of the loss of the physical space but because of the loss of fundraising events which has meant I cannot fill the shelves with the books our pupils want and need. Our pupils are still reading and borrowing and we are working hard to get the right book into the right hands at the right time – which can make all the difference.
